A fragmented market

- Coexistence of national gambling regulations between monopolies and liberalised gambling domestic markets
- increase in gambling supply and distribution channels
- an important wave of EU SM regulations to regulate the online gambling market in view of public interest objectives
- Coexistence of regional online gambling regulations
 - the Schleswig-Holstein case





A fragmented market

- Are there successful online gambling national regulatory models? Italy case study:
- License holder HQ/Server location in EEA-country
- One license for a wide range of regulated online games
- Taxation on turnover/gross profits
- Identification and registration of players
- Social responsible limits & follow-up of players' gaming activity
- Strict regulation of licensees' commercial communications
- Licensees must prevent Italian residents from accessing their ".com" websites *license is at stake*!
- ISP blocking and re-addressing any illegal gambling offer





Which future for gambling regulation in Europe?

The key issues of a fragmented market:

- Persistence of black market and different solutions to fight
- EU online gambling operators holding multiple licenses across several Member States
- Pending EU and national complaints for compliance with EU Treaty provisions and legal clarity

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A growing interest from the European institutions

- The CJEU preliminary rulings :
- absence of harmonisation at Union level
- freedom of the Member States to set their policy objectives on games of chance and to define the level of protection sought for the purpose of protecting the health of consumers.
- Any national restriction or limitation to the crossborder supply of online gambling services on the basis of public interest objectives to protect, must be demonstrated as suitable, consistent and coherent.

► No mutual recognition ↔ CJEU ground rules





A growing interest from the European institutions

• 12 June 2014: DIGIBET AND ALBERS

(C-156/13) about German online gambling legislation

- EU Treaty principles does not preclude the co-existence of the gambling licenses of Schleswig Holstein and the socalled 'Inter State Treaty' agreed by the Länder.
- German Treaty's compliance with EU law still open.

♦ 30 April 2014: PFLEGER

(C-390/12) about Austrian gambling legislation

- national restrictive measures on gambling is compliant with EU law only if it is consistent and proportionate.
- Unjustified or disproportionate restriction of the freedom to provide services under Article 56 TFEU is also not permitted under the Charter of Fundamental Rights.





A growing interest from the European institutions

• 12 September 2013 : BIASCI AND RAINONE

(C-660/11 8/12) about Italian offline gambling tender

- Awarding conditions are to be drafted in a clear, precise and unequivocal manner, based on objective criteria.
- The fact that an operator holds, in the Member State in which it is established, an authorisation permitting it to offer gambling does not prevent another Member State, while complying with the requirements of EU law, from making such a provider offering such services to consumers in its territory subject to the holding of an authorisation issued by its own authorities.

◆ 27 March 2014: Telekabel Wien (Case C-314/12)

- It is possible to impose an injunction on ISP to block certain websites, provided that a fair balance is kept between applicable fundamental rights.





A growing interest from the European institutions

- The 2009-2014 European Commission :
- Green Paper consultation
- Action plan "Towards a comprehensive European Framework for Online Gambling"
- Recommendation on online gambling on protecting consumers, players and minors from online gambling
- The 2014-2019 European Commission :
- Gambling regulators expert group to continue
- Recommendation on match-fixing
- Work in progress on technical standard on gambling equipment





A growing interest from the European institutions

• The 2014-2019 European Commission :

Work in progress on EU standard on gambling equipment

- digital age and identity verification tools
- platform certifications
- games certifications
- common auditing mechanisms

• The current Council Italian presidency

Strong focus on sport integrity and preventing bettingrelated match fixing
