Standardisation on common rules – progresses (1/2)

EU Commission Action plan "Towards a comprehensive European Framework for Online Gambling" - 2012

 explore the possibility of a European standard on gambling equipment including gambling software

EU Commission annual Union work program for European standardization - 2015

 identifies online gambling services as a domain where possibly to use European standardisation as a policy tool





Standardisation on common rules – progresses (2/2)

Expert Group on Gambling Services (gambling regulatory authorities from all EEA countries)
Stakeholders workshops– 2014, 2015, 2016

- EU standardisation on common (minimum) reporting obligations of operators
- Work in progress on best practices for technical requirements regarding IT control system, testing and certification

Future formal standardization request to the European Standardisation organisations on a standard on reporting to regulators





Standardisation on reporting to regulators - objectives

Development of (a) European standard(s) for reporting purposes, in support of supervision of online gambling services by the competent gambling regulatory authorities of the Member States:

- ◆ Reduce regulatory information obligations by the supply of certain standard information
- ◆ Assist the competent gambling regulatory authorities in a review/drafting of national regulations of online gambling services
- **♦** Ensure the quality of data to be reported on
- ◆ Technologically neutral and in particular suitable for voluntary use for regulators





Standardisation on reporting to regulators - contents

Core elements reporting to regulators:

- ♦ Financial transactions (stakes, GGR, balances, deposits and withdrawal amounts by players, etc.)
- ◆ Player information (identification; accounts data; payment methods, etc.).
- **♦** Gambling activity (game product; number of sessions/hours by game; etc.)



Developed in a neutral platform by all interested parties through a transparent and open process (consensus).





Standardisation on reporting to regulators -PROS

PROs

- Duplication of regulatory requirements renders the regulated gambling offer uncompetitive compared to the unregulated offer, making the latter more attractive and undermining the purpose of regulating a sector
- ◆ Avoid unnecessary duplication of resources for operators, providers and for competent gambling regulatory authorities.
- ♦ Ensure compliance enforcement through a safe environment to the customer and avoid gaming related crime.



Standardisation on reporting to regulators - CONS

PROs

♦ Non binding and voluntary measure addressed to National Regulators (subsidiary principle).

CONS

- **♦** Expansion of the market
- Conflicting national standards are withdrawn
- ◆ Leading to harmonization in the field of gambling





Standardisation on reporting to regulators - Italy

The Italian online gambling market is one of the most advanced and mature market

ADM – Italian gambling authority

- Active participation in the Expert Group
- **♦** Real Time reporting on :
- player information (immediate matching with central system database)
- gambling activity
- financial transactions
- Monthly report on players' balances
- Quarterly report on service levels data, AML data

UNI – Standardisation national authority

Presently inactive





Gambling regulatory authorities cooperation

EU Commission Action plan "Towards a comprehensive European Framework for Online Gambling" – 2012

 Enhance administrative cooperation between gambling regulators (Expert group) composed of representatives of Member States.

♦ Expert group specific tasks among which:

- advise and assist the Commission in the preparation and implementation of policy initiatives;
- exchange of experience and good practice in the area of gambling services.





Gambling regulatory authorities cooperation

Cooperation arrangement on online gambling services – 27 November 2015

- ♦ It covers:
- (i) the organisation of gambling, in particular authorisation requirements and calls for tenders,
- (ii) its supervision and compliance, including the protection of consumers and players, the prevention of money laundering and fraud, and the integrity of bets, and
- (iii) education and research
- National gateways attached





Gambling regulatory authorities cooperation- Italy

Forerunner bilateral cooperation agreement between French (Autorité de Régulation des jeux en ligne - ARJEL) and Italian (Agenzia delle Dogane e dei Monopoli, ADM formerly AAMS) gaming authorities - 28 June 2011

- implement a cooperation and information sharing process
- foster contrast of illegal gambling, sports frauds
- improve operators' control when licensed in both countries





Gambling regulatory authorities cooperation- Italy

Enhanced group of gambling authorities regular meetings on online gambling and enhancing exchanges of information on:

- protection of consumers and preventing gambling addiction;
- fighting illegal gambling;
- preventing fraud and criminal activities;
- ensuring integrity of the games.



This arrangement is fostering proactivity of the Member State regulatory authorities in line the subsidiarity principle.
